IS YOUR HOME READY FOR WINTER?

5 ways you can safeguard your home for the winter season.

As the temperatures drop and the days grow shorter, there's a natural inclination to create a warm and cozy haven at home. Unfortunately, as we see increased use of heating equipment, candles and electrical items, the number of home fires tends to increase during winter months.

Here are five ways you can safeguard your home for the winter season.

- **1. Ensure carbon monoxide and smoke detectors are working properly.** If your detectors are battery-operated, replace the batteries annually. Test the detectors once a month and give them a good dusting to ensure the sensors are clear of dirt and debris.
- **2. Inspect electrical cords.** We depend on more cords during winter, whether for holiday lighting, extension cords or portable heaters. Before using any corded items, double check to make sure cords aren't frayed or cracked. If you use portable space heaters, remember to keep them at least 3 feet away from flammable items. Use models that include an auto shut-off feature and overheat protection. Space heaters can take a toll on your energy bills. Use them efficiently (to heat smaller spaces) and safely. Never plug a space heater into a power strip. Speaking of power strips...

3. Avoid overloading electrical outlets and power strips.

When overloaded with electrical items, outlets and power strips can overheat and catch fire. If you use power strips for multiple devices, make sure the strip can handle the electrical load. For a safer bet, look for power strips that include surge protection.

4. Clean the fireplace to improve safety and efficiency.

There's nothing better than a warm fire on a chilly night, but it's important to maintain your fireplace for safety. As wood burns, a sticky substance known as creosote builds up in the chimney. When creosote buildup becomes too thick, a chimney fire can ignite. The chimney should be cleaned at least once a year to reduce fire risks. Regular cleaning also improves air flow and limits the amount of carbon monoxide that seeps indoors.

5. Practice safety in the kitchen. As we spend more time in the kitchen during the holiday season, be mindful of potential fire hazards. Never leave food that's cooking on the stovetop unattended. Clean and remove spilled foods from cooking surfaces and be mindful of where you place flammable items like dish towels.

OFF PEAK HEATING

What is Off Peak Heating? It is a heating system that draws energy during off-peak hours (nighttime) while electricity is in lower demand and, therefore, less expensive. Heating systems that work for this would be highly efficient furnaces or room units that generate the heat at night and store it in ceramic bricks to distribute throughout the day; when the room thermostat calls for heat, the stored heat in the bricks is discharged into the area to satisfy the heating requirements. The amount of heat stored in the brick core of the heater is regulated in relation to weather conditions. When put on a separate meter and load management controls, this heating system allows you to take advantage of a lower kilowatt rate of 5.35¢.

PUMPKIN PIE WITH PECAN CRUNCH TOPPING

Cream Cheese Layer:

8 oz. block cream cheese (softened)

1/4 cup sugar

1/2 tsp vanilla

1 egg

1 - 9 inch pie crust (unbaked)

Topping:

3/4 cup coarsely chopped pecans

3/4 cup brown sugar

3 Tbsp butter

Pumpkin Layer:

1 1/4 cups pumpkin (canned or cooked)

1/2 cup sugar

1/4 tsp ginger

2 eggs (slightly beaten)

1 tsp cinnamon

1/4 tsp nutmeg

1 cup evaporated milk

Combine cream cheese layer ingredients and pour into pie crust. Combine pumpkin layer ingredients and pour on top of cream cheese layer. Bake at 350 degrees for 65-70 minutes or until a knife comes out clean. Cool until set. For the topping, combine ingredients, then spread gently over the pie. Place under broiler for 2 minutes or until mixture begins to bubble. Allow the pie to cool. Enjoy!

TRUST BOARD AWARDS GRANTS

The Mille Lacs Community Trust Board meets quarterly to distribute funds raised through Operation Round Up. This September, the board awarded \$20,500 in grants to local non-profit organizations including: Advocates Against Domestic Abuse (HOPE), Aitkin County Search & Rescue, Crisis Line & Referral Service, Lakes Area Restorative Justice Project, Mille Lacs Area Health Foundation, Mille Lacs Trails, Second Harvest North Central Food Bank, South Aitkin First Responders, and Wealthwood Rod & Gun Club. The total amount of grants awarded since the start of Operation Round Up has reached an astounding \$1,508,979!

Operation Round Up is a voluntary program at Mille Lacs Energy Cooperative where our generous members roundup their electric bill payment to the nearest dollar. All of the funds raised go into the trust fund which is donated back to the community. RED FLAGS RULE

As many as nine million Americans have their identities stolen each year. As a result of that startling statistic, the Federal Trade Commission has developed a regulation called the "Red Flags Rule." The Red Flags Rule requires businesses to develop a program to detect, prevent, and minimize the damage that could result from identity theft.

The data privacy of our members is important to us, and as an MLEC member, you may be asked to provide additional information and identification when you make inquiries on your account, such as verifying the last four digits of your social security number.

A member may complete an Authorized Contact Agreement form to allow us to give account information to anyone other than the member. This permits an Authorized Contact to make inquiries on the account to which they are authorized. The Authorized Contact must provide their name, date of birth, and the last four digits of their social security number in order to receive account information. While these practices may seem intrusive, please understand that these procedures are in place to protect your member data and prevent the occurrence of identity theft.



STRAY VOLTAGE

Electrical supply systems delivering power to farms, homes, and businesses are grounded to the earth to make them as safe as possible and to ensure their reliability. The ground of these electric systems results in some current flow through the earth. Animals sometimes respond to the voltage differences between two points, a condition commonly referred to as stray voltage.

Help with stray voltage problems can come from many sources: veterinarians, dairy field representatives, electricians, county agents, and your electric cooperative. If you suspect stray voltage may be a problem on your farm, the first step is to have your electrician check your equipment in the barn and balance the load, if possible. The holiday season is upon us, and that means we'll be using more energy in the kitchen. When possible, cook with smaller countertop appliances instead of the stovetop or oven. Smaller appliances like slow cookers, air fryers and Instant Pots

When using the oven or stovetop, match the size of the pot to the heating element and place a lid over the pot while cooking. The food will cook faster, and you'll use less energy.
